# Objectives

This survey was designed to assist the World Bank Group (WBG) in gaining a better understanding of how stakeholders in Albania perceive the WBG. The survey explored the following questions:

1. What opinions do key stakeholders have of the WBG when it comes to its effectiveness, relevance, alignment with Albania's development priorities, and other key indicators? Are opinions improving or declining?
2. How the WBG is perceived as a development partner? Are opinions improving or declining?
3. What key topics the WBG communicates around do stakeholders recall? Is there a relationship between message recall and views of the WBG's work?

# Overall Context

# Familiarity with the World Bank Group


**Year comparison:** Respondents in this year’s Country Survey reported significantly higher levels of familiarity with the World Bank Group than in FY20:

Mean familiarity: FY23 = **7.1**;  
FY20 = **6.1**.

**Collaboration:** Respondents who indicated that they collaborated with the WBG in FY23 reported significantly higher levels of familiarity with the institution’s work:

Mean familiarity: Collaborate with the WBG = **7.9**  
Do not collaborate with the WBG = **5.6**

**Stakeholders:** Respondents from the Government reported higher levels of familiarity with the WBG in FY23, but it did not reach statistical significance.



Statistically similar across stakeholder groups

Government respondents included: Office of the President / Prime Minister / Minister; Office of a Parliamentarian; Government Institution; and Local Government;

# Trust in Institutions

The World Bank Group (WBG) and the United Nations (UN) continued to be the most trusted institutions in Albania among those studied. The central government, local government, and the media were considered the least trusted institutions, according to respondents.

**Stakeholder Analysis:** Government respondents reported significantly higher trust in the WBG (mean = 8.8) compared to Non-Government respondents (mean = 7.8).

In this year’s survey, 65% of respondents indicated that they collaborated with the WBG but only 46% collaborated in FY20. Because respondents who collaborate with the WBG tend to rate it more positively, analyses were conducted comparing FY23 to FY20 just among those who collaborate with the WBG to make sure the increased ratings over time were not due to the difference in the samples. Indeed, when just looking at ratings among those who collaborate with the WBG, respondents in FY23 rated their trust in the WBG, the IMF, the UN, the European Delegation, other development banks, and bilateral organizations significantly higher than in FY20; and respondents in FY23 rated their trust in the media significantly lower than those in FY20.

Scale: 1: To no degree at all – 10: To a very significant degree





# Land/Forest Degradation and Air Pollution are Top Concerns in Relation to Climate Change

About two-thirds of respondents were very concerned about **land and forest degradation** (65%) and **air pollution** (64%) when it comes to the potential impacts of climate change in Albania. Respondents were also very concerned about the potential impact of climate change on **forest fires** (59%), **public health** (56%), and **unsafe drinking water** (55%).



# Key Performance Indicators Have Improved

In FY23, respondents gave significantly higher ratings for the WBG’s **alignment** with development priorities, **relevance** to development, and **effectiveness in achieving results** in Albania compared to FY20.



# The WBG's Knowledge Work

Across all respondents, perceptions of the significant contribution of WBG knowledge work and activities to development results in Albania have improved significantly compared to FY20. When examining only those respondents who collaborate with the WBG, perceptions have also improved, although they did not reach statistical significance (FY23 mean = 8.5; FY20 mean = 8.0).

Scale: 1-10 (1: Not significant at all– 10: Very significant)





# The WBG's Accessibility and Responsiveness

Across all respondents, perceptions of the WBG's **responsiveness to needs** significantly improved compared to FY20. Respondents continued to rate the **accessibility to WBG's staff and experts** highly.

When examining only those respondents who collaborate with the WBG, perceptions still improved; however, it did not reach statistical significance (access to WBG mean, FY23 = 8.3 and FY20 = 7.9; responsiveness mean, FY23 = 8.1q and FY20 = 7.6).

**Stakeholders:** Government respondents reported significantly higher ratings for the WBG's responsiveness to needs (mean = 8.2) and access to WBG staff (mean = 8.4) compared to Non-Government respondents (mean = 7.3 and 7.2, respectively).




# The WBG as a Development Partner and Collaborator

Respondents gave the highest mean ratings for the WBG’s collaboration with **other donors and development partners**, which significantly improved compared to FY20. Respondents also rated the WBG’s collaboration with the **central government** highly.

When examining only those respondents who collaborate with the WBG, ratings for the WBG’s collaboration with other donors trended in the same direction but did not reach statistical significance. (FY23 mean = 8.2; FY20 mean = 7.7).

**Stakeholders:** Government respondents reported significantly higher mean ratings for the WBG’s collaboration with the central government (mean = 8.6), local government (mean = 7.5), and other donors and development partners (mean = 8.5), compared to Non-Government respondents (mean = 7.4, 6.7, and 7.6, respectively).



# Stakeholders' Engagement with the WBG

**77%** of respondents recalled hearing or seeing something about the WBG in the last 30 days. Those who collaborate with the WBG were significantly more likely to recall hearing or seeing something (90%) than those who don't collaborate (55%).


Of these respondents, 6 in 10 recalled hearing or seeing something about the WBG on **Television** or through **direct contact with WBG staff**. Respondents who reported seeing information on **social media** (40%), predominantly utilized **Facebook**.

# Topics Recalled

Of those respondents who recalled seeing or hearing something about the WBG in the last 30 days, more than half recalled seeing or hearing about **WBG global economic forecasts** (60%), and **WBG work or research on climate change** (52%).




What topics were included in what you saw or heard? (Check all that apply) (N=93)

# Message Recall and Perceptions of WBG Work

The agreement that the WBG supports countries to ensure the transition to more diversified and cleaner sources of energy was highest across all respondents (mean = 7.8).


Those respondents who recalled seeing or hearing something about the WBG in the last 30 days tended to have higher levels of agreement on key messages regarding the WBG's work (see the chart on the right), although these differences did not reach statistical significance.





## Current Affiliation






Which of the following best describes your current affiliation? (Select only 1 response) (N=130)

# Methodology

# Methodology

**From April 2023 to June 2023**, a total of **476** stakeholders of the WBG in Albania were invited to provide their opinions on the WBG's work in the country by participating in a Country Opinion Survey (COS). Participants were drawn from the Office of the President, Prime Minister, or Minister; Office of a Parliamentarian; government institutions; local governments; bilateral / multilateral agencies; private sector; civil society; academia, research institutes, think tanks; and the media.

**A total of 130 stakeholders participated in the survey (27% response rate).** Respondents completed the questionnaire via an online platform.

Every country that engages in the COS must include specific indicator questions; several of them are aggregated for the World Bank Group's annual Corporate Scorecard (please refer to the [Indicator questions](#) section of this report).

# Statistical Analysis

## **Scale bucketing:**

When mentioning **Low**, **Medium**, and **High** in the scales throughout this report: 1-6 is low; 7-8 is medium; and 9-10 is high.

## **Statistical significance:**

Key statistically significant findings are denoted with an asterisk (\*) throughout the report or discussed in the descriptions of the charts. Significance is measured at  $p$ -value < .05

# Comparison of FY20 and FY23

The results of this year's Country Survey were compared to those of the Country Survey conducted in FY20 (with a response rate of 60%, N=393).

Comparing responses across Country Surveys reflects changes in attitudes over time, as well as changes in respondent samples and changes to the survey instrument itself. To reduce the influence of the latter factor, only those questions with similar response scales/options are analyzed.

The distribution of the stakeholder groups in the final samples for the FY20 and FY23 Country Surveys is listed in the table on the right.

Additionally, this year, the COS project utilized the Pulse Survey format, which is a shorter version conducted entirely online by the COS team. The list of respondents was identified and provided solely by the country team, which indicates a shift in the stakeholder composition compared to FY20. In the previous survey, at least 20% of the respondents were provided by a local fielding agency.

These differences in the stakeholder composition between the two years should be taken into consideration when interpreting the results of the past-year comparison analyses.
