Pilot 30 participants were selected purposefully to represent all age groups above 18, and proportionately by both genders. Furthermore, socio-economic status was also considered as much as possible.

For the survey, all 19 atolls of the Maldives were included except for Vaavu atoll and Faafu atoll. They were excluded because of the small population of each atoll, all islands combined. This is not expected to impact on the survey findings as people live on remote islands (atolls being a natural geographically dispersed grouping of the islands) and have similar lived experiences irrespective of the smallness of the atoll. These two atolls were eliminated given the travel logistics against the small sample required (less than 18 people from an island).



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All islands and atolls declared by the government as cities were considered in the **urban** sample. All remaining islands were considered as **rural** community. Sample was targeted at the ratio of 40% (400) urban and 60% (600) rural participants.

In considering the rural sample, sample was selected from one island of each atoll, proportionate to the population of the specific atoll. (Reaching more than one island was logistically not feasible, mostly because of financial & time constraints). The sample island was selected based on available reliable enumerators. A call for enumerators was called on public platform (the government gazette) for 2 enumerators from each atoll.

From the urban community, all wards of the greater Male' area were included proportionately to the population. Sample from the two island-cities (Fuvahmulah & Kulhudhuffushi) were drawn randomly across each island. Sample from Addu city (atoll of a few islands) was limited to the atoll-capital island alone.

With the above quota sampling, a further stratification was utilised to cater to **gender** (Male, 51%; Female 49%) and the **age groups** (see the first table below that shows the 2014 census age groupings and population data). The following tables were provided for the survey enumerators to guide them in the sampling process.

The numbers are rounded within the age groups and thus resulting in a few additional counts in the sample)

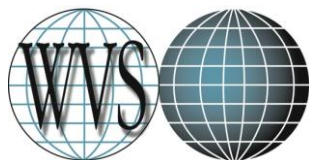

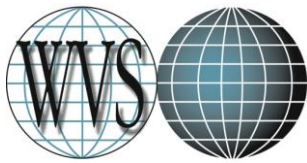

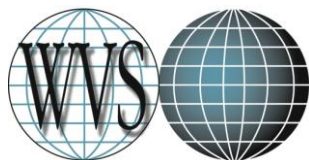

The sample design has limitations in missing out on recruiting expat workers as expatriates tend to live within worker-quarters and this was not covered (or were missed) in data collection, as they were not specifically targeted.

Further response bias might have happened depending on the time of house visits. However, enumerators reported many instances where they arranged call backs to recruit a particular person from the household depending on the stratification. Not all such instances have been documented.

A total of 1261 people were approached during the street walk, and 1039 people agreed to participate. 222 people did not consent to participate for a variety of reasons, mostly cited as time difficulty. Details of all refusals have not been documented.

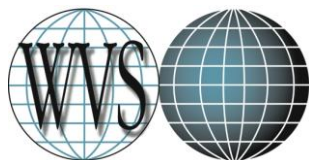

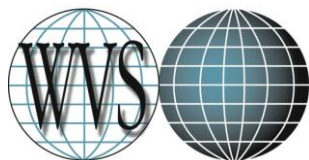
