

CHAPTER 1

OBJECT, SCOPE AND ORGANISATION OF THE SURVEY

1.1 OBJECT OF THE SURVEY

Research into the income and expenditure patterns of urban non-white households has been one of the Bureau's main fields of study since its establishment in 1960. A large number of its reports deal with this subject.¹⁾

Various factors heighten the need for recent data on non-white income and expenditure. Chief among them are rapid growth and continuous change in the urban non-white market, which are the effects of rising income and education levels and the influence of Western life styles.

In the second half of 1985 the Bureau launched a series of surveys to gather information on urban non-white income and expenditure. These surveys covered approximately 6 400 households in the following groups and areas:

- (a) Urban black households in Pretoria, Johannesburg, Rest of the Witwatersrand, Vaal Triangle, Durban Complex, Cape Peninsula, Pietermaritzburg, Port Elizabeth, Kimberley, Bloemfontein, OFS Goldfields and Klerksdorp.
- (b) urban coloured households in the Cape Peninsula, Johannesburg and Port Elizabeth, and
- (c) urban Indian households living in the Durban Complex and Johannesburg.

A series of 18 regional reports on multiple households, of which this is the ninth, will be released to expedite publication of the survey results. In these reports the results will be presented mainly in the form of tables, with remarks on the main findings. The regional reports will be followed by a summary report on multiple households and a report on the income and expenditure patterns of single non-white households. Lastly, a report on market potentials in metropolitan areas will be compiled from the information on non-white households, gathered by the Bureau, and on white households, gathered by Central Statistical Services.

1.2 SCOPE OF THE SURVEY

1.2.1 Study unit

The basic unit of study was the household, and multiple and single households were distinguished. This report only deals with multiple households.

A multiple household consists of one or more families, or a group of two or more persons, dependent on a common or pooled income, and usually living in the same house. Its members need not necessarily be related by blood or marriage.

Persons who usually sleep and eat under the same roof and, generally speaking, are bound by domestic and economic ties, comprise a household unit. A multiple household includes members who are in legal custody or in hospital (for a period of less than six months), away on holiday, and at boarding school. A family member working and living away from home is not regarded as a member of the household unless he contributes the larger part of his income to the household and visits the family at least every fortnight. Married or unmarried working children and other working relatives living and eating with the family are not considered to be members of the household unless they contribute the larger part of their income to the household.

A single household consists of one person who is financially independent of any person or household group although he may be supporting persons elsewhere. A person who rents a room in a house and eats all his meals with the household, but pays all his own major expenses, including board and lodging, is not regarded as a member of that household. He is considered to be a household on his own.

1.2.2 Survey area

The survey covered all multiple black households living in the urban areas of Greater Soweto excluding Dobsonville.

1.3 SAMPLE SIZE

The sample of 400 stands was randomly selected. Experience in previous surveys conducted by the Bureau has shown that samples of this size with a low refusal rate supply statistically reliable data within reasonable limits.

1.4 ORGANISATION OF THE SURVEY

1.4.1 Questionnaire

1.4.1.1 Construction

The questionnaire was based on the Bureau's standard questionnaire for similar surveys among non-whites and on the Central Statistical Services questionnaire for white household surveys. Detailed information was requested under the main headings set forth below.

- (a) Members of the household and other persons living with the household - relationship to head, sex, age, marital status, occupation, education.
- (b) Religion and ethnic group of the head of the household.
- (c) Main activity of employers of working members of the household.
- (d) Income data (only members of the household) - salaries and wages, income in kind from employer, bonuses, profit from own business, income from property, income from pensions of all kinds, lump sum payments received during the past twelve months, contributions received in cash and in kind; payments from boarders.
- (e) Amenities - ownership of radios, TV sets, sewing machines, etc.
- (f) Expenditure on housing.
- (g) Expenditure on transport - private and transport services purchased.
- (h) Expenditure on durables and semi-durables during the past year (excluding clothing) - cash, credit, hire-purchase.
- (i) Expenditure on clothing during past year (cash and credit) - women's, men's, girls', boys' clothing, baby clothes.
- (j) Food and beverages bought for consumption at home or taken to work (during past week in some cases and past month in others) - grain products, meat products, fish, fats and oils, milk products and eggs, vegetables, fruit and nuts, sugar, non-alcoholic beverages, alcoholic beverages, miscellaneous foods.
- (k) General expenditure (during past month in some cases and past year in others) - cigarettes and tobacco, fuel and light, washing materials, polishing and cleaning materials, disinfectants, insecticides, dry-cleaning and laundry, personal care, recreation, taxes, communication, insurance, savings, education, medical and dental, reading-matter and stationery.

- (1) Alcoholic drinks bought and consumed in bars, beer-halls, shebeens, etc., during the past week.
- (m) Food and non-alcoholic beverages bought and consumed away from home in cafés, restaurants, beer-halls, etc., during the past week.
- (n) Cash support of family members or relatives not living with the household during the past year.
- (o) Expenditure on holidays during the past year.

1.4.1.2 Pretesting

Pretesting was not required because the questionnaire was based on the standard questionnaire the Bureau has used in many similar surveys in the past.

1.4.2 Sampling

Of the 400 stands drawn in the sample, 29 were occupied by two multiple households, four by three multiple households and one by four multiple households. In total, 426 multiple households were interviewed while 14 refused to give information.

1.4.3 Organisation of the fieldwork

1.4.3.1 Publicity

Interviewers were issued with letters assuring respondents of the importance and confidentiality of the information gathered in the survey.

1.4.3.2 Selection of interviewers

Blacks did the fieldwork. They were chosen because they were working and living in these areas, were familiar with the inhabitants, knew the areas well, were fairly well educated and could win the confidence of the respondents. Not one of them had an occupation that might alarm or arouse suspicion among the respondents.

1.4.3.3 Training of interviewers

A three-stage training course was conducted by a Bureau staff member over a period of about two weeks. In the first stage interviewers were briefed on the purpose and importance of the survey and were instructed in the method of interviewing. Each interviewer was given two questionnaires to study and complete for his own and a friend's family. The second stage of training comprised the checking and discussion of completed questionnaires with individual interviewers. In the third stage, two respondents were interviewed by each trainee, and completed questionnaires were again thoroughly checked with the interviewers concerned. Interviewers were also issued with written notes on interviewing methods and techniques and the concepts used in the questionnaire.

In previous surveys the questionnaire had taken two to three hours to complete, tiring both respondent and interviewer. As the questionnaire could not be condensed, interviewers were instructed to spread its completion over at least two calls and to limit the length of each call to one hour.

1.4.3.4 Interviewer control

Interviewers were instructed to return completed questionnaires at intervals of not more than two weeks.

Check visits and telephone calls to detect cheating and discrepancies in the method of interviewing were made on 10 % of the respondents interviewed by each fieldworker.

1.4.3.5 Enumeration

Most of the questionnaires were filled in from October to November 1985.

1.4.4 Processing of the data

1.4.4.1 Editing

Questionnaires were carefully edited by Bureau personnel under the supervision of a senior staff member so as to ensure the completeness and reliability of the data. Errors were referred back to the interviewers for correction.

1.4.4.2 Coding

Items were precoded as far as possible in the questionnaire, or coded in the editing stage. Precoded items were punched direct from the questionnaire, and coding sheets were completed for items not coded beforehand.

1.4.4.3 Tabulation

Tabulation was done by computer.

1.5 RELIABILITY OF THE RESULTS

Properly conducted sample surveys yield useful estimates but not exact values. Errors may arise from sampling, non-response, reporting and processing. The nature and scope of these errors are discussed below.

1.5.1 Sampling error

Sampling errors arise because only a fraction of the population is interviewed. As the data collected in this survey are based on representative samples drawn by a probability method, the size of the sampling errors can be calculated.

It is practically impossible to compute sampling errors for all averages and percentages in this report.²⁾ Some indication of the proportions assumed by sampling errors can however be gained by calculating the sampling error for average annual household income and average household size. The sampling error for the average annual income of a multiple household was R361,09. For average household size, the sampling error was 0,10. It may therefore be stated at the 95 % confidence level that the average annual income of multiple households may be R707,74³⁾ or 7,4 % higher or lower than the average of R9 624,41. It may also be stated at the 95 % confidence level that the household size of multiple households (5,48) may vary between 5,27 and 5,69 members.

Sampling error depends on the absolute size of the sample and the variation in the data, the rule being that the smaller the sample and the larger the variation, the larger the possible sampling error. The minimum sample sizes required to gather statistically reliable data on expenditure items at the 95 % confidence level and with 10 % precision were calculated with the aid of expenditure data gathered from black households in Soweto in 1975.⁴⁾ The following are examples of the number of households to be interviewed for statistically reliable data on selected items of expenditure: 106 for radio licences, 158 for coal, 211 for white sugar, 263 for fresh beef, 272 for tea, 259 for soap powder, 287 for toothpaste, 880 for women's dresses and 7 545 for dining-room suites.

Wherever the total sample is subdivided by different classifications the number of observations may be small and consequently subject to a larger sampling error compared with that of the total sample. As the number of sample households in each characteristic is shown in each tabulation, the analyst will be able to apply caution and judgement in his use of the figures. For the most part, groups of households with low sample counts are of little significance and so the usefulness of their data is limited. Observations by income group are however given to facilitate regrouping expenditure data.

1.5.2 Reporting errors

Reporting errors usually stem from memory errors, misunderstanding of questions or reluctance to answer them, and incorrect entries by interviewers.

The need to minimise reporting errors in the survey was borne in mind in constructing and testing the questionnaire and selecting and training fieldworkers. The quality of the fieldwork and the data collected were thoroughly checked by supervisors and office staff.

Before concluding this section, it is as well to mention two factors with a possible bearing on the findings. The first is that respondents often try to impress interviewers by exaggerating or reporting imaginary expenditure on status items. Conversely, expenditure is frequently underreported on such items as alcoholic beverages because excessive purchases are socially less acceptable. The market potentials calculated for 1975 from expenditure data were evaluated by comparison with secondary information.⁵⁾ It was found, for example, that households probably report correctly on the purchases of essential items, like food, but tend to underestimate expenditure on socially less acceptable items. Expenditure on alcoholic beverages was understated by 213 % and expenditure on cigarettes and tobacco, by 88 %. It was also found that households reporting on durable goods, such as clothing and certain items of furniture, tend to overstate expenditure on these items. Figures relating to these items should therefore be viewed with caution.

Second, regard must be had to the use and availability of seasonal items in the survey months, which were October to November, and their inflationary or deflationary effect on calculations of annual expenditure figures. One such item is coal, of which smaller quantities are bought in summer. If this survey had been conducted during the winter months, the annual expenditure figure calculated for coal would probably have been higher.

1.5.3 Processing errors

Errors of calculation are not uncommon in processing the data. Measures taken to eliminate them include sequence tests which show up duplication of data on computer tapes, and minimum and maximum value tests which identify impossible values. Wherever checking revealed serious punching and coding errors, all the work was redone.

1.5.4 Validation

The reliability of survey findings can be measured by comparison with secondary sources. Unfortunately, comparable sources were not available for validation in this instance.

1.5.5 Non-response

As stated in Section 1.4.2 only 14 of the multiple households selected for interviewing refused to supply information. The rate of non-response was therefore so low as to have very little, if any, effect on the reliability of the data.


FIGURE 2.1EARNERS AS A PERCENTAGE OF THE POTENTIAL LABOUR FORCE (20-64 YEARS), 1970 TO 1985

WORK STATUS OF MALES BY AGE GROUP, 1985




BY AGE GROUP, 1970 TO 1985



BY LEVEL OF EDUCATION, 1970 TO 1985



BY INCOME GROUP (AT 1985 PRICES), 1962 TO 1985



BELOW THEIR MLL AND SLL, 1980 AND 1985



BY LEVEL OF EDUCATION OF HOUSEHOLD HEAD, 1985





FIGURE 2.9AVERAGE HOUSEHOLD INCOME IN SELECTED AREAS, 1985

2.2.3 Household expenditure2.2.3.1 Household expenditure by main expenditure group

In 1985 food was still by far the most important main expenditure group among black multiple households in Johannesburg (Table 2.6), despite its percentage decrease from 42,0 % in 1962 to 39,1 % in 1980 and 33,0 % in 1985. It is also well above the corresponding figures of 29,3 % for coloured and 27,9 % for Indian multiple households in Johannesburg (Research Reports Nos. 130.3 and 130.6). The second most important expenditure item in 1985 was housing and electricity which made up 15,1 % of the total expenditure of black multiple households. Next were transport (9,7 %), furniture and household equipment (8,6 %), clothing and footwear and accessories (7,1 %) and insurance and funds (5,5 %).

Regarding the relative shares of the main expenditure items in total expenditure, there is a long-term downward trend in food and an upward trend in transport expenditure. The share of housing and electricity has risen from 6,8 % in 1970 to 15,1 % in 1985. As opposed to this, there is a decrease in expenditure on fuel and light from 7,1 % in 1962 to 1,7 % in 1985, suggesting that electricity is largely replacing coal, wood and paraffin as sources of energy in the areas covered by the Johannesburg survey. As regards tax, blacks are paying considerably more in direct taxes which rose from 0,7 % of their total household expenditure in 1962 to 3,4 % in 1985.

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A person who rents a room in a house and eats all his meals with the household, but pays all his own other expenses, except board and lodging, is not regarded as a member of that household but is considered to be a household on his own. Married or unmarried working children and other working relatives living and eating with the family are regarded as separate households unless they contribute the major part of their income to the household.

A family member working and living away from home is not regarded as a member of the household, even though he contributes with some regularity to the household's income.

1.2.2 Study area

The study area comprised all territory belonging to the Republic of Ciskei (Figure 1.1).

Three separate areas were distinguished for the purpose of drawing a sample: metropolitan areas, regional centres, and sub-regional and rural service centres (hereafter called rural areas).

Four metropolitan areas were distinguished and included in the sample:

1.2.3 Universe and sample

Sampling was done in two phases: the selection of the areas to be included in the survey, and the selection of sample units.

The method of selecting the areas to be included in the survey was worked out in consultation with Professor D J Stoker of the Human Sciences Research Council. As stated earlier, it was decided that all the areas classified as metropolitan areas and regional centres would be part of the sample. In the rural areas 48 villages and towns were selected as being representative of all the areas. The number of these towns and villages in districts where interviews would be conducted was determined by the size of the population in the districts concerned. The districts were further subdivided into headman's areas, and population numbers were consulted for the random selection of the towns and villages in such areas that would be included in the survey.

As regards the selection of the final sample units, a random, systematic sample of 1 404 names was drawn from lists of addresses. The number of sample units allocated to each town in the metropolitan areas and regional centres was proportionate to the populations of the towns in these two areas. The sample was however disproportionately distributed among the metropolitan areas, regional centres and rural areas. For practical reasons the minimum number of addresses selected in towns and villages in the rural areas was set at 12. Thus the sample was proportionately distributed in districts in rural areas and disproportionately distributed in individual towns and villages. The population, number of households and sample units are set forth by area in Table 1.1.

1.3 ORGANISATION OF THE SURVEY

1.3.1 Questionnaire

Two questionnaires were designed for the survey. The first or longer questionnaire contained questions on the demographic characteristics of the household, all possible sources of income, and items of expenditure. The second or shorter questionnaire was identical with the first, except that its expenditure questions were limited to housing.

The longer questionnaire for the survey was based on the standard questionnaire used in many similar surveys in the past. Although the pattern remains basically the same, the questionnaire is revised and adjusted from time to time and is submitted to clients for comment and recommendations before being used in a particular survey.

The two questionnaires were addressed alternately to the sample units.

In both areas Community, social and personal services is the most important sector of employment. In Kimberley 53,6 %, and in Bloemfontein 50,2 % of the earners are employed in this sector. Next is Wholesale and retail trade and catering and accommodation with 19,5 % and 24,3 %, respectively, for the two areas. Mining and quarrying provides employment for 8,6 % of the earners in Kimberley, but in Bloemfontein this sector is hardly worth mentioning as a sector of employment.

2.2.2 Analysis of income

Average annual income and sources of household income are presented in Table 2.4. Average income per household is R6 102,08 in Kimberley and R5 611,33 in Bloemfontein. The higher figure for Kimberley reflects the larger number of earners and recipients of income per household compared with Bloemfontein.

the population estimated at 45 612 in the 1980 survey increased at a rate of 50,6 % per year. Considering the tremendous influx of persons into Botshabelo, the uncertainty about the actual size of its population is not surprising.

On the basis of the household head's ethnic group (Table 6), the Sotho are by far the most important, comprising as they did 80 % of the households in 1984. The only other group worth mentioning is the Xhosa group with a share of 14,5 % of the households.

Average household size in 1984 was 6,04 persons compared with 5,5 in 1980. These figures exclude family members temporarily absent, i.e. persons generally away from home for more than two weeks at a time. Such persons represented 0,77 persons per household in 1984 compared with 0,73 in 1980.

The average number of persons per household in receipt of an income rose from 1,15 persons in 1980 to 1,63 in 1984. The percentage of the population receiving an income therefore rose from 21 % in 1980 to 28 % in 1984. Another favourable observation in this context is that a higher percentage of recipients of income (63,4 % in 1984 as against 53,7 % in 1980) earned such income as economically active proprietors or workers in recognised sectors of employment (Table 11). About 35 % of the workers were employed in Botshabelo itself, while 91,5 % of the rest were commuters working in Bloemfontein. Employees in Community, Social and Personal Services rose as a percentage of recipients of income from 19,3 % in 1980 to 32,7 % in 1984. The population growth and development of Botshabelo has therefore had considerable impact on the creation of new job opportunities for the inhabitants of the township.

2.2.2

Income

Average income per household rose from R1 221,00 in 1980 to R3 471,22 in 1984. In the same period income per head rose from R222,00 to R574,71. These figures respectively represent increases of 29,9 and 26,8 % on average per year in income per household and income per head. The average income of earners and recipients of income rose by 19,2 % per year from R1 057,26 to R2 128,78.

The total income of the permanent inhabitants of Botshabelo increased from R10,1 million in 1980 to R134,9 million in 1984, i.e. at a rate of 91,0 % per year. Factors contributing to this phenomenal increase were mainly the massive influx of persons into the area, the increase in the average income of earners and recipients of income, and the higher average number of persons per household in receipt of an income.

The main source of income was salaries and wages, representing 64,2 % of income in 1984. The corresponding figure for 1980, namely, 66,7 %, is not significantly higher. This source of income is followed by contributions received whose share was 18,7 % in 1984 as against 22,5 % in 1980. The most important changes include the greater share of pensions which rose from 2,9 to 6,0 %, own business (from 1,0 to 3,4 %) and payments of boarders and lodgers (from 0,4 to 2,4 %).

2 SCOPE OF THE SURVEY

A sample of 150 multiple Bantu households¹⁾ was drawn from each of the magisterial districts of Bethal and Viljoenskroon.

The population and the number of the households (universe) are shown in Table 1.

2.2.1 Demographic characteristics

2.2.1.1 Residence

According to Table 1.1 57,0 % of the estimated 769 634 black single households in the PWV area live in hostels and compounds, 24,0 % are domestic servants and gardeners living on white private premises, 11,5 % live on black private premises and the remaining 7,5 % live on business and government premises. The breakdown for the estimated 443 299 black single households in other metropolitan areas in Table 1.2 shows that 70,7 % of them live in hostels and compounds, 13,0 % on white private premises, 12,4 % on black private premises and 3,9 % on business and government premises.

2.2.1.2 Sex

Table 2.1 shows the percentage distribution of respondents by sex and type of residence in the PWV and other areas, namely 70,5 % males and 29,5 % females in the PWV area and 78,4 % males and 21,6 % females in the other areas. Slightly more males than females were interviewed on black private premises, whereas the respondents living in hostels and compounds were mostly male. Approximately 70 % of all the respondents living on business and government premises were male, whereas 94,1 % of those on white private premises were female.

Earners, particularly women, in multiple households in the PWV area earned far more than earners in single households. The average income from employment of earners who are members of multiple households in the PWV area* is R5 150,66 for all earners, R6 254,90 for male and R3 743,95 for female earners. According to Table 2.7 female earners living in hostels and compounds in the PWV area and on business and government premises and white private premises in the other metropolitan areas earned more than male earners in terms of salaries in 1985. Occupation, employment sector and length of service, which are among the factors influencing remuneration, are discussed in the paragraphs that follow.

3.2.2.2 Household expenditure patterns of the population groups in White metropolitan areas

As may be expected, there are no major differences between the expenditure patterns of Whites in the ten metropolitan areas compared in Table 3.4, and many of the smaller differences are merely due to variations in average income. Table 3.3 presents the average income of White dwellings and households in metropolitan areas.

The average household income of Whites in Johannesburg was 14,8 % higher than that of Whites living in the rest of the Witwatersrand, the area with the next highest average household income. It is not surprising therefore that the highest percentage expenditure on income tax (12,1 %) was recorded for Johannesburg Whites, who also had some of the highest percentage expenditures on such items as holidays and servants.

The Vaal Triangle had the fourth highest average household income, but the lowest percentage expenditure on income tax (7,6 %). The explanation for this is to be found in the distribution of household income, as shown in Table 3.5.

1.3.2 Procedure

The following sampling procedure was applied:

- (1) the 495 sample points were proportionally allocated to the three magisterial districts on the basis of the number of households in each district, as estimated by Venda officials;
- (2) sample points in magisterial districts were allocated to chief's areas on the basis of the estimated number of households per chief's area;
- (3) the required number of sample points within a chief's area was drawn at selected villages;³⁾ and
- (4) individual sample points in villages were selected by means of route samples.

There were large variations in population size from one chief's area to another. The Tshivhase and Mphaphuli areas had by far the biggest populations, so that more than 100 sample points had to be drawn in each of them. Adequate sample coverage in these two fairly large areas was ensured by including about 10 villages in each of them. The villages were spread over the chief's areas. In the smaller chief's areas, one, two or three villages were included, depending on the size of the area and the homogeneity of activities. Special care was taken to avoid over- or under-representation for example in villages whose inhabitants were chiefly engaged in irrigation. Their numbers were estimated by the agricultural officers concerned.

The number of households (universe) and sample points are presented by magisterial district in Table 2. The number of households interviewed (513), expressed as a percentage of the estimated number of households in Venda (66 701), was 0,77 %. Hence sample figures must be multiplied by a factor of 130 to arrive at the total figures for the area.

2.2.2.2 Total income

Total income (average income x number of households) amounted to R10,4 million for multiple households and R0,86 million for single households. Blacks in Umtata therefore represented a consumer market in the region of R11,26 million in 1975. Of this sum R10,4 million was cash income and the rest (R0,85 million) was spent on Blacks' behalf.

2.2.3 Expenditure2.2.3.1 Expenditure pattern

Percentage expenditure on main items of expenditure is set forth by urban area in Table 2.3. Umtata households differed from households in the other areas chiefly in that their percentage expenditure on insurance and funds was higher.

2.2.3.2 Market size

Market potentials for about 550 products and product groups can be calculated from the expenditure data in Annexure A. Total annual expenditure¹⁾ on a few main product groups and products is calculated for 1975 in Table 2.4.

CHAPTER 1

INTRODUCTION

1.1 OBJECT AND SCOPE OF THE STUDY

The object of the study was to compile personal income statistics for analysing the welfare of whites, blacks, coloureds and Asians on both national and regional levels over the past two decades. Besides being an important indicator of purchasing power, personal income figures are also applied in calculations of the size, growth and structure of the demand by private households for consumer goods and services.

This report contains personal income statistics on a national basis for the years 1960, 1965, 1970, 1975 and 1980, and on a regional basis for 1960, 1970 and 1980. Personal disposable income figures for 1960, 1970 and 1980 are also presented by magisterial district. The report covers the RSA and the national states. The national states comprise the four independent national states, i.e. Transkei, Bophuthatswana, Venda and Ciskei, and the self-governing states, i.e. Gazankulu, Kangwane, KwaNdebele, KwaZulu, Lebowa and QwaQwa. As far as possible the regional classification follows the 1980 magisterial district and regional boundaries. The regional delimitation is discussed in detail in Chapter 3.

1.2 DEFINITION OF PERSONAL INCOME AND METHOD OF THE STUDY

1.2.1 Definition of personal income

Nel¹⁾ defines personal income as: '.... current income earned or received from all sources by the inhabitants of an area, including transfers from government bodies, businesses and persons living in other areas, but excluding transfers between persons living in the same area.'

Personal disposable income is calculated by subtracting direct taxes (chiefly income tax) and compulsory employees' contributions to social security funds (the only one in South Africa being the unemployment insurance fund) from personal income. Personal income per head and personal disposable income per head are calculated by dividing personal income and personal disposable income respectively for a particular group and/or area by the total number of persons in the particular group and/or area. Income figures at current prices do not reflect the decline in purchasing power as a result of price increases, but real personal income (i.e. income at constant prices) is calculated by deflating personal income at current prices by the consumer price index.

The personal income and personal disposable income figures calculated in this study differ slightly from those calculated by the South African Reserve Bank for purposes of the national accounts.* In some respects they also differ from the concept of household income in the

income and expenditure pattern surveys of the Bureau of Market Research.* The term personal income also denotes income in kind, such as free meals and accommodation supplied by employers, home produce and certain receipts in kind from the state.

1.2.2 Method of the study

The methods of calculation applied in the study are described in Chapter 3. The general approach is however briefly outlined in the paragraphs that follow.

From the definition of personal income it is evident that personal income is a very comprehensive concept. The starting point in the calculation of personal income was to divide the personal income of each of the four population groups into its four main components, i.e. employees' remuneration, owners' income (mostly net profit from non-incorporated undertakings), income from property, e.g. interest, dividends and rent received by individuals, and, finally, transfer payments and transfers. The fourth category includes all receipts by individuals for which a service is not rendered, such as social pensions, sub-economic housing scheme subsidies and transfers between persons from one geographical area to another.

First, national totals were calculated that included the national states. Central Statistical Services census data is an important source of information for the years for which figures are available. This study relied heavily on the censuses conducted in the various sectors of the economy (hereinafter termed censuses of undertakings because the respondents were undertakings in this instance). With the aid of the censuses of undertakings personal income received in the form of employees' remuneration and owners' income was calculated by economic sector for most of these sectors in the years for which such census data were available. Other sources were consulted for the relevant information pertaining to the sectors in which comprehensive censuses of undertakings are not taken, i.e. Finance, Insurance and Real Estate, and Community, Social and Personal Services. Unfortunately most census figures are only released several years after the census was taken. Wherever census data for the relevant years were not available, other sources had to be consulted for the calculation of employees' remuneration and owners' income on a national basis. In the case of employees' remuneration, one of the chief sources was the short-term salaries and wages series compiled by Central Statistical Services from sample surveys, while owners' income was calculated, *inter alia*, from information furnished by the Directorate of Inland Revenue³⁾ of the Department of Finance and the Department of Agriculture. In the case of income from property, a variety of sources were consulted for all the years concerned, such as the Bureau's own sources and information furnished by the Directorate of Inland Revenue.³⁾ For transfer payments and transfers, both the Bureau's own sources and information obtained from government departments and other public authorities were consulted.

The comparability of data over time presented a major problem in the study owing primarily to the constitutional development of the self-

1960 TO 1980



 (WHITES = 100)



IN THE RSA AND NATIONAL STATES BY TYPE OF INCOME, 1960 AND 1980




INTRODUCTION

1.1 OBJECT OF THE STUDY

The primary aim of this study was to calculate household expenditure (in cash and in kind) on approximately 500 products and services in the National States and TBVC countries in 1985 and to establish the size and structure of the markets for specific products and services. Economically the National States and TBVC countries have gained in importance over the years. In 1975 for instance expenditure by their inhabitants represented 8,0 % of total expenditure in cash and in kind in South Africa and their share in personal income rose from 5,2 % in 1960 to 6,2 % in 1970 and 8,3 % in 1980. This is a growing market which obviously merits the attention of marketers of consumer goods and services. Household expenditure is analysed in this report in terms of main expenditure groups and individual expenditure items.

1.2 SCOPE AND METHOD OF THE STUDY

1.2.1 Scope of the study

The study area covered all population groups in two broad geographical regions: the National States and the TBVC countries (see Table 1.1). Qwaqwa, Gazankulu, KwaNdebele, Kangwane, Lebowa and KwaZulu make up the National States and Republics of Transkei, Bophuthatswana, Venda and Ciskei are the TBVC countries.





c. Person



Table 2.3 presents the average annual income of male earners in Pietermaritzburg and Durban from their main sources of income by occupation, sector of employment and level of education in 1985. Professional male earners in Pietermaritzburg earned R19 878,42 on average in 1985. This figure is roughly four and a half times higher than the earnings of unskilled workers. The difference of 6,5 % between the income of male earners in Pietermaritzburg and Durban is not statistically significant, especially in view of a possible standard error of 8,7 % for household income at a confidence interval of 95 %, as calculated in Section 1.5.1.


STRUCTURE OF THE AVERAGE MULTIPLE HOUSEHOLD, 1975 AND 1985

BY AGE GROUP, 1975 AND 1985




From 1975 to 1985 average real household income rose at an average annual rate of 3,5 %, with corresponding growth rates of 2,5 % per person, 3,2 % per earner and 2,3 % per earner and other recipient of income (Table 2.2). Real income per person rose

more slowly than income per household because of the increase in average household size. A similar trend emerges from a comparison of income per earner and other recipient of income and income per household. This may be ascribed firstly to the increase in the average number of earners and other recipients of income per household and, secondly, to the proportional decrease

in recent years. A comparison of the occupations of black men in 1975 and 1985 (Table 2.5) reveals the progress made in the field of training. In 1975 skilled and semi-skilled workers together made up only 26,6 % of employment opportunities, while in 1985 this figure had nearly doubled by 50,0 %. In contrast, unskilled labour fell from 52,3 % to 31,2 % in the period.

Black women doing semi-skilled work experienced the sharpest increase in average income (71,9 %). Those doing unskilled work also experienced a fairly sharp increase of 27,5 % as opposed to a negative growth rate for male employees. In Community, social and personal services, the sector employing by far the most black women, average income rose by 51,2 % compared with 59,2 % in Wholesale and retail trade and catering

and accommodation. By level of education income rose most rapidly for those with Std 5-6 (29,6 %) and Std 7-8 (26,2 %).

2.2.2 Changes in economic welfare

Figure 2.4 indicates economic welfare in terms of the real income of black multiple households in Bloemfontein in 1985 compared with 1975. Although over half the households (54,2 %) still had an average income of below R5 000,00 per year in 1985, this figure is a great deal lower than it was in 1975, namely 76,5 %. The effect of the shift from the lower income groups is most evident in the two highest income groups (R7 000 - R9 999 and R10 000+) which rose from 3,4 % in both instances in 1975 to 15,8 % and 12,1 %, respectively, in 1985. If the recession and the high rate of unemployment in 1985 are taken into account, the distribution of real income reveals a considerable improvement in the economic welfare of most black households.

The economic welfare of black households may also be measured by the Minimum and Supplemented Living Levels calculated by the Bureau of Market Research. These MLL and SLL studies take into account such variables as average household size and the structure of various household sizes, thereby giving a better indication of the distribution of economic welfare among all the members of the population. The MLL denotes the minimum financial requirements of members of a household if they are to maintain their health and have acceptable standards of hygiene and sufficient clothing for their needs. The SLL makes provision for more items than the MLL and can be described as an attempt at determining a modest,

(AT 1985 PRICES), 1975 AND 1985






factors responsible for this are the poor economic and employment conditions of the 1980s, as reflected in a 7,2 % drop in the real income of the average earner, and an increase in average household size from 4,88 members in 1975 to 5,47 in 1985.

2.2.3 Household expenditure

2.2.3.1 Household expenditure by main expenditure group

The expenditure patterns of coloured households in Port Elizabeth in 1970, 1975 and 1985 are presented by main expenditure group in Table 2.7. The most important groups in 1985 are, in order of importance, food, housing and electricity, clothing, footwear and accessories, transport, furniture and household equipment, and insurance and funds. These groups together represent just over 75 % of total household expenditure. Percentage expenditure on food in 1985 amounts to 33,7 % compared with 34,3 % in 1975 and 33,8 % in 1970. Similarly there are only slight variations in percentage expenditure on housing and electricity: 10,4 % in 1985, 11,2 % in 1975 and 11,5 % in 1970. Percentage expenditure on clothing, footwear and accessories has declined from a high of 14,4 % in 1970 to 13,4 % in 1975 and 9,7 % in 1985. Between 1970 (3,7 %) and 1975 (10,6 %) household expenditure on transport rose a relatively sharply but declined to 7,9 % in 1985. There has been a steady increase in expenditure on furniture and household equipment from 3,8 % in 1970 to 4,3 % in 1975 and 6,2 % in 1985. Percentage expenditure on insurance and funds amounted to 6,2 % in 1985 compared with 6,8 % in 1975 and 5,6 % in 1970.
