Study description:	AZERBAIJAN
Fieldwork dates:	February 1-28, 1997
Principal investigators:	Hans-Dieter Klingemann, Social Science Research Center Berlin, Germany; Ali Aliev (SIAR), Baku, Azerbaidjan
Sample type:	Population: Total non-institutionalized population of Azerbaijan, 18 years and older, without citizens living in Karabakh and Nakhichevan. Five-stage area probability sample: (1) The country is divided into eight strata. For each stratum the desired number of respondents is defined proportionally to population size. (2) Within each stratum the primary sampling units are selected at random with probability proportional to size. (3) Within each primary sampling unit 3-4 secondary sampling units (voting districts) are randomly selected. The total number of secondary sampling units was 105. (4) Within each secondary sampling unit houses (third sampling unit) are selected to serve as starting point for the interviewer who followed the random route procedure to select a household (fourth sampling unit). (5) Within each household the respondent is randomly selected using the (next) birthday method (fifth sampling unit).
Fieldwork institute:	Surveys in the three Transcaucasian countries were coordinated and supervised by Merab Pachulia, Georgian Institute of Public Opinion (GIPO), Tbilisi, Georgia. The Azerbaijani cooperation partner was Ali Aliev, SIAR, Baku.
Fieldwork method:	Interviews were conducted by 50 interviewers which were especially trained for the study. 400 randomly selected addresses were checked to ensure quality of fieldwork.
