Live-in domestic workers and lodgers are separate households: a separate household questionnaire should be completed for them.

Roster and tracking (people who stay, out-migrants, in-migrants, deaths and births)

1. Only the CSMs have been pre-populated on the roster. Any CSM who has moved, but is not deceased, needs to be tracked.
2. For these CSMs we will ask a '15 days/year' question and, if the 15days/year is true, a '4 nights/week'. Only for those CSMs who have a "no" to either will we ask the "moved/dead" option. This will open up a tracking screen for 'movers'.
3. Once this is complete, we will ask if anyone else fits the 15 days/year requirement.
4. Of these 'new' people, we next ask the 4 nights a week question. This will separate the new people on the roster into TSMs or NRs, which affects whether we want to ask them to fill in a questionnaire or not. TSMs will be interviewed, NRs will not.
5. If there are any 'new' children whose birthday falls between the Wave 1 interview date and the Wave 2 interview date (B7) and who are born to a female CSM (B13), then this child must be classified as a CSM as well.
