

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I. Objectives

This survey was designed to assist the World Bank Group (WBG) in gaining a better understanding of how stakeholders in Namibia perceive the WBG. The survey explored:

- *General Issues Facing Namibia*
- *Overall Attitudes toward the World Bank Group*
- *World Bank Group's Effectiveness and Results*
- *The World Bank Group's Knowledge Work and Activities*
- *Working with the World Bank Group*
- *The Future Role of the World Bank Group in Namibia*
- *Communication and Information Sharing*
- *Background Information*

II. Methodology

From June to August 2017, 304 stakeholders of the WBG in Namibia were invited to provide their opinions on the WBG's work in the country by participating in a Country Opinion Survey (COS). Participants were drawn from the office of the President/Prime Minister, office of a Minister, office of a Parliamentarian, employees of ministries/ministerial departments/implementation agencies, Project Management Units (PMUs) overseeing implementation of WBG projects or consultants/contractors working on WBG-supported projects/programs, local government officials or staff, bilateral/multilateral agencies, private sector organizations, private foundations, the financial sector/private banks, NGOs/community-based organizations (CBOs), the media, independent government institutions, trade unions, faith-based groups, youth groups, academia/research institutes/think tanks, and the judiciary branch.

A total of 125 stakeholders participated in the survey (41% response rate). Respondents received an invitation via email and completed the questionnaire online or completed the questionnaire with a representative of the fielding agency (either in person or via telephone).

Every country that engages in the Country Opinion Survey must include specific indicator questions that will be aggregated for the WBG's annual Corporate Scorecard. These questions are identified throughout the survey report.


The results of this year's Country Survey were compared to those of the Country Survey conducted in FY '13 (response rate was 29%, N = 90). Unfortunately, the samples from FY '13 and FY '18 were quite disparate in terms of their representation of stakeholder groups and given the overall sample sizes, it would not be statistically sound to weight them to be more similar. Hence, changes in responding between FY '13 and FY '18 may be due to actual changes in the country, but it is also possible that these changes are due, in some part, to differences in the respondents. III. Demographics of the Sample

Current Position

- For all further analyses, the small number of respondents from the office of the President/Prime Minister, the office of Minister, employees of ministries, and independent government institutions were combined into one “Government” category; the few respondents from the financial sector/private banks were combined with those from the private sector; the few respondents from private foundations were combined with those from NGOs/CBOs; and respondents from bilateral/multilateral agencies, the media, trade unions, faith-based groups, and academia were combined into an “Other Civil Society” category. The three respondents who indicated “Other” were excluded from further analyses.




“Which of the following best describes your current position? (Select only ONE response)”

Area of Primary Specialization






Geographic Locations

Exposure to Agencies within the World Bank Group




“Which of the following agencies of the World Bank Group do you primarily engage with in Namibia? (Select only ONE response)” (Respondents choose from a list)

Familiarity with the World Bank Group

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in this year's Country Survey indicated significantly lower levels of familiarity with the WBG compared to respondents from the FY '13 Country Survey (mean rating = 5.4).
- **Locations:** Respondents from the City of Windhoek indicated significantly higher levels of familiarity with the WBG (mean rating = 3.3) compared to respondents from Outside of Windhoek (mean rating = 1.9).




"How familiar are you with the work of the World Bank Group in Namibia?"


"In general, would you say that Namibia is headed in ... ?" (Respondents chose from a list.)

Development Priority

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY '13 Country Survey indicated that the most important development priorities in Namibia were education and skills (percentage of respondents = 52%), job creation/employment (43%), and public sector governance/reform (36%), followed by economic growth (20%) and industrial development (18%).





Factors Contributing to Poverty Reduction

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY '13 Country Survey indicated that the areas that would contribute most to poverty reduction in Namibia were education and skills (percentage of respondents = 54%), economic growth (49%), and job creation/employment (46%), followed by rural development (48%), reduce inequality (18%), and agricultural development (17%).






"When thinking about the idea of “shared prosperity” in your country, which of the following TWO best illustrate how this would be achieved in Namibia? (Choose no more than TWO)"



Global Climate Change




"In your view, is global climate change a very serious problem, somewhat serious, not too serious, or not a problem? (Select only ONE response)" (Respondents chose from a list.)






"To what extent does the World Bank Group’s work help to achieve development results in Namibia?" (1 - "To no degree at all", 10 - "To a very significant degree")


"To what extent do you believe the World Bank Group's staff is well prepared to help Namibia solve its most complicated development challenges?"

Greatest Value

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY '13 Country Survey indicated that the WBG's greatest values to Namibia were its technical assistance (percentage of respondents = 45%), training/capacity building (34%), and financial resources: policy-based lending/budget support to the Government (34%), followed by financial resources: investment lending (24%) and policy advice (23%).



Effectiveness of WBG's Instruments in Reducing Poverty





Greatest Weakness

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY '13 Country Survey indicated that the WBG's greatest weaknesses in its work in Namibia were being too influenced by developed countries (percentage of respondents = 31%), not enough public disclosure of its work (28%), and not collaborating enough with the private sector, civil society, and other non-state actors (23%).




The WBG Promoting Private Public Partnerships

Percentage of Respondents (N=116)




"To what extent do you believe that the World Bank Group's work and support help the poorest in Namibia? (Select only ONE response)" (Respondents chose from a list.)




"To what extent do you agree with the following statements about the World Bank Group's work in Namibia?" (1-"Strongly disagree", 10-"Strongly agree")

The WBG as an Effective Development Partner

- **Locations:** Respondents from Outside Windhoek gave significantly higher ratings for the WBG's collaboration with the Government (mean rating = 8.8), helping to bring discipline/effective supervision to implementation of investment projects (mean rating = 9.4), collaboration with civil society (mean rating = 6.4), straightforwardness and honesty (mean rating = 9.3), and being a long-term partner (mean rating = 9.0) compared to respondents from the City of Windhoek (mean ratings = 6.5, 5.8, 3.9, 6.4, 6.7, and 5.9, respectively).




"To what extent is the World Bank Group an effective development partner in Namibia in terms of each of the following?" (1-"To no degree at all", 10-"To a very significant degree")




"To what extent do you believe the World Bank Group measures and corrects its work in real time in Namibia?" (1-"To no degree at all", 10-"To a very significant degree")

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in this year’s Country Survey had significantly higher levels of agreement that the WBG meets Namibia’s needs for knowledge services compared to respondents from the FY ‘13 Country Survey (mean rating = 5.6).
- **Locations:** Respondents from Outside Windhoek had significantly higher levels of agreement that the WBG meets Namibia’s needs for knowledge services (mean rating = 8.5) compared to respondents from the City of Windhoek (mean rating = 6.2).





"In Namibia, to what extent do you believe that the World Bank Group's knowledge work and activities...?" (1-"To no degree at all", 10-"To a very significant degree")




"The World Bank Groups's financial instruments meet the needs of Namibia."

Making the World Bank Group of Greater Value

- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY '13 Country Survey indicated that, to make itself of greater value, the WBG should reach out more to groups outside of Government (percentage of respondents = 41%), reduce the complexity of obtaining World Bank financing (33%), and improve the quality of experts as related to Namibia's specific challenges (29%), followed by offering more innovative financial products (23%) and providing more adequate data/knowledge/statistics/figures on Namibia's economy (20%).











- **Year comparison:** Respondents in the FY ‘13 Country Survey indicated that they got most of their information about economic and social development issues from local newspapers (percentage of respondents = 40%), international newspapers (32%), and local radio (30%), followed by international radio (23%), local television (22%), international television (19%), and periodicals (18%).




"How do you get most of your information about economic and social development issues in Namibia? (Choose no more than TWO)" (Respondents chose from a list. Responses combined.)


"How would you prefer to receive information from the World Bank Group?






"Do you have reliable access to the Internet?"



WBG Website Usage




Internet Connection





Hence, changes in responding between FY13 and FY18 may be due to actual changes in the country, but it is also possible that these changes are due, in some part, to differences in the respondent samples.
